# Chelsea Right To Play World Cup Challenge

## Stamford Bridge 20th May 2010

In this year's Right to Play World Cup Challenge, the group games were all 5-a-side, played on newly-lined quarters of the hallowed turf of Stamford Bridge. The sixteen teams were split into four groups of four and all played each other once to decide who would go into the Cup (top two in each group) and who would be contesting the Plate (bottom two). **Bain Capital, Goldman Sachs** and **CVC** were the only teams to take nine points from nine and it was they, alongside strong-looking sides from **Right to Play** and **UBS** who looked like being the main threats of the day. Also reaching the Cup quarter finals were **Lonestar Capital Management, TPG** and **Bridgepoint**.

**Blackstone** managed a win and a draw on pitch one but the battle with Group A were so close that they still went into the Plate competition rather than the Cup. They were joined in the second-tier competition by **KKR, Moelis, Duke Street, CDR, Global Infrastructure Partners, Kohlberg Kravis & Roberts, Providence Equity** and **Permira**.

After quarter-finals which included a rather unwise jump out of the goal area from the unlucky Goldman Sachs keeper and two lengthy penalty shoot-outs on the top pitches, we were left with just **UBS, Right to Play Club, Bridgepoint** and **Bain Capital** in the Cup and **Blackstone, KKR, G.I.P.** and **Moelis** in the Plate.

The semi-finals saw the games expand from 5-a-side to 7-a-side and with fewer players able to take the time to catch their breath on the sub's bench, the length of the day started to take its toll and weariness began to show. In the Cup **UBS** and **Right to Play Club** struggled to find their shooting boots and had to settle for penalties which saw the tenacious young **RtP** boys out of the competition as the **UBS** keeper's distracting dancing between the sticks paid off. It was green versus green on the opposite pitch where **Bain Capital** saw off **Bridgepoint** in a frantic game that ended 3-1. **Blackstone** and last year's Plate Winners **Moelis** were both victorious in their respective semi-finals, setting up a final that was a repeat of each team's first fixture on the day in Group A.

As the players lined up for the finals, the ground-staff were put to work again as they once more expanded the field of play, this time from 7-a-side to full pitch 11-a-side. **Blackstone**, knowing they had beaten **Moelis** in the group stages, were confident but their opposition were equally buoyed by their team's latest celebrity signing – Freerunner and Right to Play Ambassador **Sébastien Foucan** who was convinced to perform some outrageous stunts should there be a call for a **Moelis** goal celebration! Sadly for the boys in red and black though, the call did not come as **Blackstone's** Adele Ocherif went home the hero after he scored the only goal in the final, crowning his team **Chelsea Right to Play World Cup Challenge 2010 Plate Champions**.

**UBS** had already improved on last year's success in the Plate final when they were unlucky to end up with the silver medals by making it to the 2010 *Cup* Final. They squared up to a confident **Bain Capital** team who had only conceded four goals all day. It was to be **UBS's** day, however, as after Michael Abraham broke down the left to put the team ahead, his teammate James Connelly sealed the deal by tricking the keeper and slotting home the winner in front of the Matthew Harding stand. 2-0 victors, the jubilant boys from **UBS** were crowned **2010 Cup Champions**.

In addition to the team prizes, there were individual prizes to give out at on the podium and this year these went to **Bain Capital's Chris Douglas** whose pace and skill won him the **Player of the Tournament** award, and **Jorge Alcover** from **Goldman Sachs** who with seven goals in just four games took home the tournament's **Golden Boot**.
